Vocabulary

Directions: Frontload (introduce and review) these vocabulary words with your students to facilitate their understanding of the topic and coinciding resources:

- 1. **House of Representatives** (n.) The lower chamber of the United States Congress, with the Senate being the upper chamber. Together, they comprise the national bicameral legislature of the United States.
- 2. Bicameral (adj.) (of a legislative body) Having two branches or chambers.
- 3. **Enumerated powers** (n.) Powers granted to the federal government of the United States by the United States Constitution.
- 4. **Implied powers** (n.) Powers that, although not directly stated in the Constitution, are implied to be available based on previously stated powers.
- 5. **Proportional Representation** (n.) An electoral system in which parties gain seats in proportion to the number of votes cast for them.
