Directions: Frontload (introduce and review) these vocabulary words with your students to facilitate their understanding of the topic and coinciding resources:

- 1. **Insurrection** (n.) A violent uprising against an authority or government.
- 2. Coup (n.) A sudden, violent, and illegal seizure of power from a government.
- 3. Electoral Vote Counting (v.) The 12th Amendment mandates Congress assemble in joint session to count the electoral votes and declare the winners of the election.
- 4. **Capitol Building** (n.) The meeting place of the United States Congress and the seat of the legislative branch of the United States federal government.
- 5. House Committee (n.) At the federal level, the House of Representatives has committees to consider bills and issues and oversee agencies, programs, and activities within their jurisdiction.
