EXTEND THE RESOURCES

Below is a list of ideas and ways you might use the resources provided on this Classroom Law Project resource page to extend learning and civic engagement for your students:

Start with Choice & Inquiry:

The sections on this Current Event Resource Page connect to the constitutionally created tradition of the State of the Union. There should be a subtopic within this Current Event that students may find interesting. For example, the history of the State of the Union, the shift from letter to in-person address, the role various media technologies have played in shaping the State of the Union, the responses to the State of the Union, etc.. Give students the opportunity to choose a topic or connection of interest and start with that.
