## 50th Anniversary of Oregon's Land Use System

Below is a list of ideas and ways you might use the resources provided for this Current Events Post to extend learning and civic engagement for your students.

## **Beyond the Classroom**

### Conducting an Interview - LINK TO DIRECTIONS

- **Activity Summary**: Students learn the basic skills and techniques of conducting an interview to solicit a person's opinion about a specific Current Events topic.
- Suggestion for this Current Event: Planning decisions are complex. The best way to learn
  all the intricacies of an issue is to talk to someone involved. Pick a topic that is going on
  in your town at present and have students interview stakeholders and decision makers.
  Then bring students together to compare what they learned from each person
  involved.

# **Conversation for Advocating**

#### **Silent Debate** - LINK TO DIRECTIONS

- Activity Summary: Students sit side by side and debate an issue back and forth on the same piece of paper, each writing in their own column. Teachers can assign positions, including role play from the perspectives of historical or current people. This way students work together in an engaging way to identify multiple points of view on an issue.
- Suggestion for this Current Event: Write this statement on the board: Urban Growth Boundaries are serving Oregon well. Students pair up for a silent debate. The student on the left takes an 'agree' stance and the person on the left takes a 'disagree' stance. If you want to use affirmative and negation terms instead of agree/disagree, you'd be super fancy.

## **Conversation for Understanding**

#### Socratic Seminar - LINK TO DIRECTIONS +++ LINK TO GRAPHIC ORGANIZER

Activity Summary: A teacher poses an open-ended, overarching question, and then
allows students to have a collaborative discussion using the questioning method with
each other. It is inherently collaborative and encourages students to explore multiple



- facets of difficult topics and acknowledge diverse perspectives, even if they don't agree with them.
- **Suggestion for this Current Event**: Housing is the number one issue on the minds of Oregonians. Have students work together to answer the question: How do we ensure Oregon has enough affordable housing for its population?

# **Media Literacy**

### **Evaluating a Source** - LINK TO DIRECTIONS

- Activity Summary: Students practice critically examining sources. There are many
  variations of this exercise that align to specific content, this activity attempts to be able
  to be applied universally, regardless of content/form.
- **Suggestion for this Current Event**: Have students evaluate Governor Tom McCall's famous speech from 1973. Primary source: <u>full text and image of document</u>

## Research

#### **Issues & Solutions - LINK TO DIRECTIONS**

- Activity Summary: The Issue & Solutions activity seeks to have students examine a current event and grapple with the complex issues and possible solutions centered around the topic. Students practice close reading skills while at the same time practice critical thinking skills in determining consequences and hierarchies.
- Suggestion for this Current Event: Using the interactive map and lessons from the
  Oregon Agriculture in the Classroom Foundation, have students come up with site
  specific solutions to maintain agricultural viability in your local community.

- **Activity Summary**: Have students examine the Tools of Discrimination & Resistance resources published by the Oregon Jewish Museum and Center for Holocaust



Education. Students should dedicate time to reviewing the stories that demonstrate the push-pull dynamic between discrimination and resistance. Students should examine the acts of discrimination and/or resistance within this week's Current Event Topic and connect it to the acts of discrimination and resistance highlighted in the OJMCHE resources. Following this initial examination, students can participate in either a research based project or perform in a collective act of resistance outlined in the OJMCHE materials.

• **Suggestion for this Current Event**: Investigate discriminatory land use practices of Oregon and see which ones still need to be dismantled. You can start with the history of redlining in Portland. Here's <u>an article</u> published by the Smithsonian Magazine.
